4th Annual Kansas Breastfeeding Coalitions Conference Connects Partners

The KBC hosted the 4th annual "Kansas Breastfeeding Coalitions Conference" on October 14th in Wichita. A record number of attendees came together for a day to learn new skills for engaging their communities to improve breastfeeding support on the local level. The Wichita State University School of Nursing generously donated space at the Eugene M. Hughes Metropolitan Complex for our day-long conference. With the help of the WSU Community Engagement Institute, this year's conference provided the opportunity for over 80 representatives from 37 Kansas communities to network, share ideas and resources. Participants learned more ways to grow their coalition and better support breastfeeding families in their own communities.

Featured presentations were from collaborating partners; KS Chapter of the AAP, Child Care Aware of Kansas and Kansas Department of Health and Environment Bureau of Family Health. The "Community Engagement" activity generated many good ideas for engaging different groups in your community (Click here to view the lists of ideas.) The conference was made possible from funding from KDHE Bureau of Family Health through a grant from the Kansas Health Foundation.



The BUSINESS CASE for BREASTFEEDING

STEPS FOR CREATING A BREASTFEEDING FRIENDLY WORKSITE

in cooperation with Kansas Breastfeeding Coalition, Inc.

The Kansas Business Case for Breastfeeding participated in two conferences this fall:

- The League of Kansas Municipalities (LKM) annual state-wide conference as both an exhibitor and round-table presenter. Over 500 city and county officials from across the state left with a "tool kit" of information, to include a sample policy, for how they can support their breastfeeding employees. The LKM also published an article about the Business Case for Breastfeeding in the September issue of the Government Journal. Ask your city human resource staff if they have read the article or seen the folder of information from the conference. Offer to help them implement a policy and find spaces for breastfeeding employees to pump in city and county buildings.
- Society for Human Resource Management annual state-wide conference as an exhibitor. Over 430 HR professionals attended the conference and many participated in the exhibit "game app" in which they had to answer questions about workplace support for breastfeeding employees to be eligible for a drawing. The activity led to many interesting and productive conversations at the booth!

The Kansas Business Case for Breastfeeding also presented a two-hour staff training at the Wyandotte County Health Department to educate staff about women's rights under the federal "Break Time for Nursing Moms" Act as well as how to help breastfeeding mothers successfully manage employment while continuing to breastfeeding.  of their breastfeeding employees to apply for
 the *Breastfeeding Employee Support Award*.

 to send employers.


