Diving into the Data: New State Breastfeeding Data



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CDC's national survey of **Maternity Practices in Infant Nutrition and Care** (**mPINC**) assesses maternity care practices and provides feedback to encourage hospitals to make improvements that better support breastfeeding.

- Kansas moved up to 22nd in the national ranking from 36th in 2015
- Kansas is now even with the national score
 (79/100) in 2018 while 3 points lower in 2015 (KS
 76/100 v. US 79/100)
- Kansas scored higher than 3 out of 4 neighboring states – NE 71%, OK & MO 75%, CO 85%
- Fewer Kansas hospitals (53 of 63 eligible hospitals)
 responded to the survey in 2018 than in 2015 –
 84% in 2018 v. 93% in 2015

National Total Score*











Expressing milk



Relactation



Donor human milk

COVID-19: New AAP Guidance (7/23/20)

The American Academy of Pediatrics has updated its guidance for the treatment of infants born to mothers with confirmed and suspected **COVID-19 infection**:

New guidance:

- Mothers and newborns <u>may room-in</u> according to usual facility practice.
- During birth hospitalization, birthing parents should maintain a reasonable distance from their infant when possible.
- Non-infected partners or relatives should <u>use masks and hand hygiene</u> when caring for the infant.
- Breastfeeding is strongly encouraged as the best choice for infant feeding.
- Infected mothers should perform hand hygiene before breastfeeding and wear a mask while breastfeeding.
- Mothers of NICU infants may express breast milk for their infants when infection status prohibits their presence in the NICU. Centers should make arrangements to receive this milk from mothers until they are able to enter the NICU.

COVID-19: New CDC Recommendations (8/3/20)

The ideal setting for a healthy, term newborn is to room in with their mother while in the hospital.

"Current evidence suggests the risk of a neonate acquiring SARS-CoV-2 from its mother is low," the guidance reads. "Further, data suggests that there is no difference in risk of SARS-CoV-2 infection to the neonate whether a neonate is cared for in a separate room or remains in the mother's room."

If the neonate remains in the mother's room:

- Mothers should wear a mask and practice <u>hand hygiene</u> during all contact with their neonates.
- Engineering controls, such as maintaining a physical distance of ≥6 feet between the mother and neonate or placing the neonate in an incubator, should be used when feasible.
