Local Breastfeeding Coalitions Training to develop optimal breastfeeding interventions, through sharing of model practices and policies with local community advocates and partners. KBC provides mini-grants, toolkit, annual state-level conference, and Tools for Coalitions webpage with curated resources for building coalition capacity. This includes ensuring a seamless referral system for families to receive breastfeeding support from prenatal education through the normal course of breastfeeding. It also includes a "landscape analysis" of existing breastfeeding support using the KBC's <u>Breastfeeding Support by Kansas County</u> data to identify gaps and opportunities.	Communities

Breastfeeding Friendly Local Health Department Designation A designation to recognize and celebrate Local Health Departments (LHDs) that are leading the way in supporting breastfeeding. Achieving the Breastfeeding Friendly LHD designation means the LHD has met eight criteria for breastfeeding support.	Local Health Departments
Child Care Provider Education Education and resources for child care providers to support breastfeeding through optimal infant feeding practices using evidenced-based practices. Available online monthly as well as in-person. Supported by KBC's Child Care Section.	Child Care Providers

Prenatal Breastfeeding Class Curriculum A two (2) hour class for parents. The high-quality, highly visual, infant feeding class is available for FREE to anyone in Kansas and can be integrated into health departments, hospitals or community- based prenatal education classes. KBC webpage contains additional online prenatal education classes. This class is included in "Becoming a Mom" prenatal series.	Parents
Protect Yourself, Protect Your Baby Goal: To increase COVID vaccination rates among the over 31,500 breastfeeding parents in Kansas each year.
